Personal Reflection/Group Discussion

Read Colossians 2:16-23.

1. What's your initial reaction to this passage? What stands out to you?

LEGALISM

Merriam-Webster defines legalism as strict, literal, or excessive conformity to the law or to a religious or moral code.

In the church, legalism is a term that describes our tendency to rely on what we can do for God rather than what He has done for us. It's an overfocus on religious activity to the neglect of an intimate relationship with a loving God. It can be described as a rigid, often impersonal, judgmental, self-reliant approach to the Christian life. Legalism often sounds like this:

- I can earn my way to heaven by being good enough to deserve it.
- I think I'm a Christian, but I can't be sure unless I prove it by good works.
- God must be disappointed with me. I should be praying more.
- That person might not be a true Christian because they don't read their Bible and pray before going to work in the morning.
- 2. Can you identify with any of these statements? Explain.
- 3. What are other ways legalism shows up in your life?
- 4. What are signs that a church has become legalistic?
- 5. Paul describes some spiritual dangers for those who rely on their own performance to be right with God (vs. 17-19). What are they? Can you think of other results of having a legalistic approach to the Christian life?

- 6. If rules are powerless to change us (vs. 23), how are we to understand passages like 1 Peter 1:13-16?
- 7. What do you think Jesus meant when He said *If you love Me, you will keep My commandments* (John 14:15)?
- 8. What should our approach be to the standards of Christian living? In other words, what's an alternative to legalism?
 For further insight, check out Galatians 5:13-15; 1 Peter 2:16-17.
- 9. What is Jesus' message is to you personally this week?10. What do you think Jesus' message is to Brookwood this week?
