Conversation Starter

When it comes to miracles, are you more skeptical or ready to believe? Why?

Personal Reflection/Group Discussion

Read Matthew 2:1-8.

- 1. Why did Herod ask the religious leaders "Where is the Messiah supposed to be born"? (v. 4)
- 2. Why is it significant that Jesus was born in Bethlehem? (see Micah 5:2)

Verse 3 indicates that everyone in Jerusalem was disturbed that the wise men were looking for the *newborn king of the Jews*.

- 3. Why would the religious leaders be disturbed by this news?
- 4. Why do you think the religious leaders didn't go to Bethlehem to investigate this for themselves?
- 5. Why did Herod ask the wise men, and not the religious leaders, to search for the newborn king in Bethlehem?
- 6. When has God seemed the most real, the most tangible, the most *near* to you?

Read Romans 15:13.

- 7. How is God described in this verse?
- 8. According to this verse, what is God's desire for us?
- 9. What step can you take to know Jesus better?

Communicate with God

Offer prayers of thanks to Jesus for coming near to the pain, conflict and brokenness of the world. Thank Him for specific ways He's revealed Himself to you and worked in your life.

Soul Training

Ask God, what is the first thing you want me to **know** today, and the first thing you want me to **do** today? Sit in silence for at least a minute to see what He puts in your mind.
